Singapore, **24 November 2015** – National Gallery Singapore opened its doors to the public after a decade of planning, building restoration and art research. Minister for Culture, Community and Youth, Ms. Grace Fu was at the Gallery to welcome the first visitors at 10am. The first visitors through the doors included over 50 children and community volunteers invited as part of "50 Experiences for 500 Kids", an initiative by social enterprise The Collective Effort, in support of its goal to nurture, enrich, build confidence and provide happiness by letting each child enjoy a day of unique experiences that they will remember for many years to come.

Thereafter, there will be free admission for Singapore Citizens and Permanent Residents as well as children six years and under, into all exhibition galleries (except selected Special Exhibitions) and Keppel Centre for Art Education.
