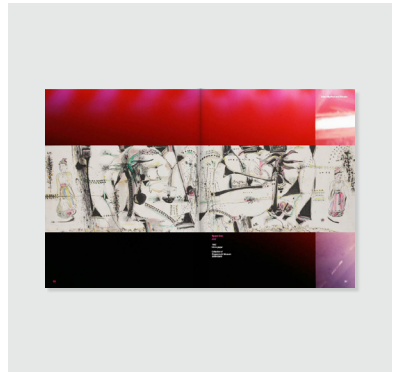
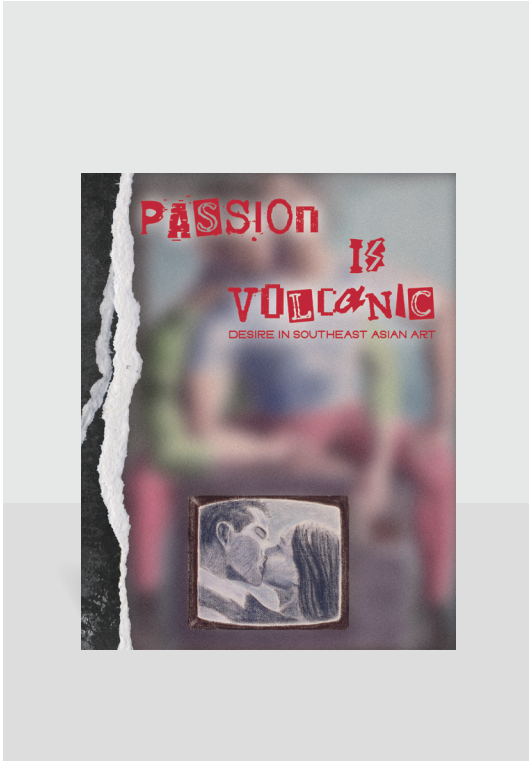

This bilingual catalogue accompanies the exhibition *He Xiangning: Ink & Intent*, co-curated by the He Xiangning Art Museum and National Gallery Singapore. Bringing together He Xiangning's artworks and archival materials, the exhibition traces her artistic journey from her involvement in revolutionary activities and experiences of wartime displacement to the stable period of her later life. The essays explore shifts in artistic traditions and political contexts, considering how He Xiangning mobilised artistic practices and social networks to support public causes, including fundraising across Southeast Asia. This catalogue draws on research into the He Xiangning Art Museum's collection and archival holdings, as well as works from National Gallery Singapore's collection. The exhibition marks the first thematic presentation of He Xiangning's works in Southeast Asia.

It explores how eros is articulated in the region and how the body, love, sex and desire have been reimagined through different processes of art making and appreciation. Spread across three themes—"Asian Mythos and Rituals," "Conventions of the Erotic" and "Public Arenas/Private Interiors"—this publication features essays, artworks and images from the exhibition. An important resource for scholars and enthusiasts alike, it is a cultural milestone on how the erotic is negotiated in Singapore.

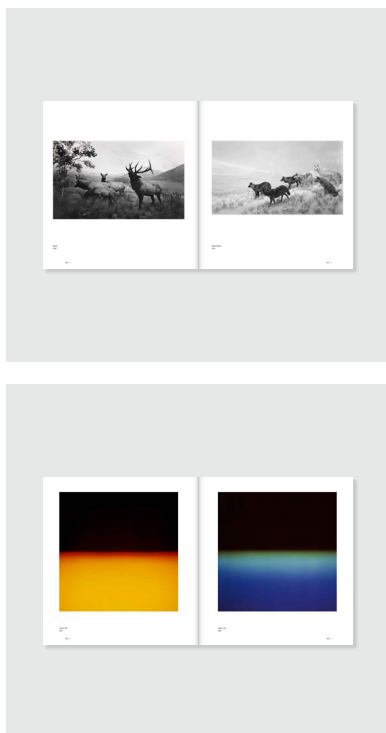
This publication accompanies the exhibition *Fear No Power: Women Imagining Otherwise*. It constellates the practices of Nirmala Dutt, Imelda Cajipe Endaya, Amanda Heng, Dolorosa Sinaga and Phaptawan Suwannakudt—artists for whom art, life and community are intertwined. Spanning the 1960s to 2010s, their works engage questions of gender, labour and power amid the shifting social and political landscapes of Southeast Asia. Featuring a commissioned text by Flaudette May Datuin, curatorial essays and republished writings and interviews with the artists, this book foregrounds their multifaceted roles as educators, writers, organisers and community builders. It traces how they have mobilised and reconfigured more fluid and equitable worlds for themselves and others—offering not answers but possibilities for how we might continue to imagine, act and create *otherwise*.

This catalogue accompanies *Temple* by Tuan Andrew Nguyen, an interactive installation in the Ng Teng Fong Roof Garden Gallery that transforms remnants of war into resonant spaces for reflection and healing. Painted in “Day-Glo safety orange,” a colour that warns of danger yet radiates renewal, *Temple* features percussive instruments that visitors are invited to interact with—bells, a chime and a gong—made from defused UXO recovered from Quảng Tri, Vietnam. Essays, photographs and an interview trace Nguyen’s artistic journey, revealing how sound, memory and form converge to reimagine the aftermath of conflict.



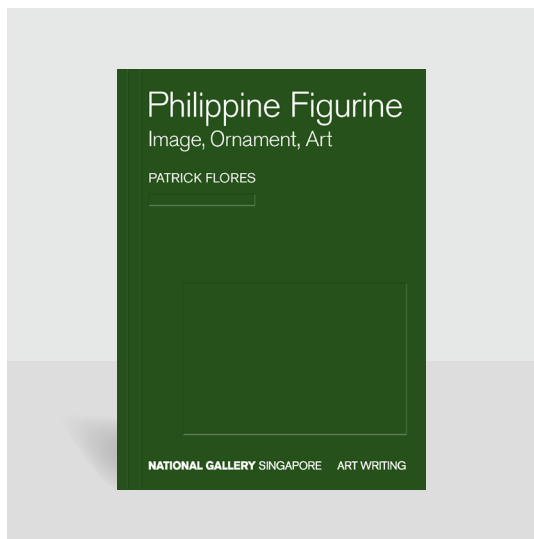

Conceived in relation to the exhibition *Hiroshi Sugimoto: Form Is Emptiness* at the Singapore Art Museum, this catalogue invites readers into the artist's contemplative world. Through texts by the exhibition curators, Harvard scholar Dr Yukio Lippit, Mori Art Museum director Mami Kataoka and Sugimoto himself, a series of resonances within Sugimoto's photographic practice unfolds, tracing its dialogue with Buddhist philosophy and cosmology; its intersections with scientific inquiry; its mediation of Sugimoto's Japanese upbringing and aesthetic sensibilities and his formative years working in 1970s New York City; as well as its allusions to poetic and aesthetic traditions. Spanning more than five decades of work, this publication takes readers through Sugimoto's enduring investigations into consciousness, time and perception. The texts extend his artistic inquiries, mapping the interplay between form and void, presence and (im)permanence.

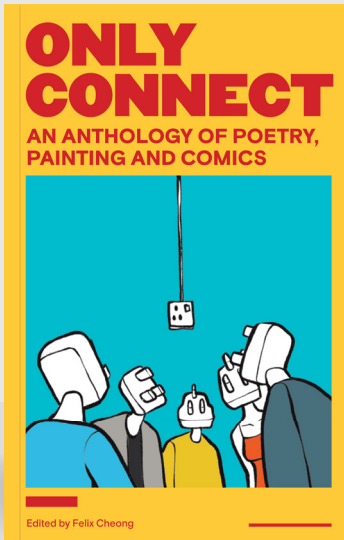

This compelling collection of essays is a mediation on “the figurine,” theorised as a means to rethink concepts of art, ornament, the decorative and the devotional, and their postcolonial implications. Each of the seven essays is a close reading of a particular image, ranging from the annual procession of the Black Nazarene in Quiapo, Manila, to the work of the 19th-century painter Juan Luna. Written by leading curator Professor Patrick Flores, this third title in the National Gallery Singapore Art Writing imprint is an enlivening reading for those with an interest in art theory and the postcolonial condition of the image in the Global South.

Philippine Figurine is an elaborately annotated, exquisitely precise art-historical exposition of the cultures of the Philippines as an archipelago and a colony. It gifts to contemporary consciousness a spectral brilliance gained from material sites of cultural knowledge. Patrick Flores leaves us beholden. —Geeta Kapur, art critic and curator.



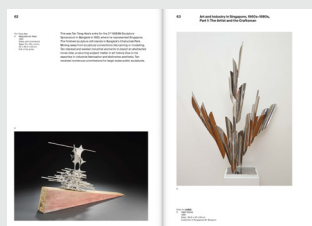
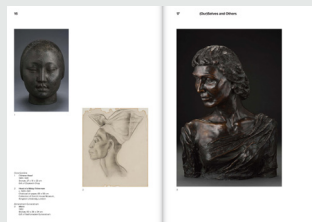
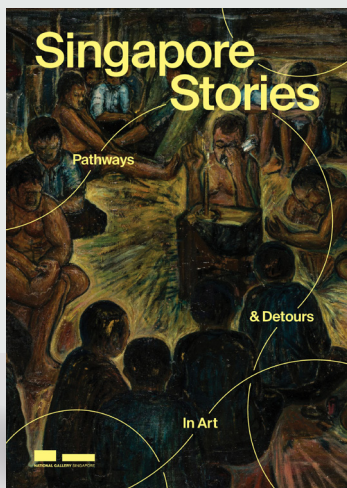

Like the works in the exhibition, these pages embrace states of becoming, unfolding and reimagining. Readers are invited to journey alongside the artists in dreaming up these worlds.

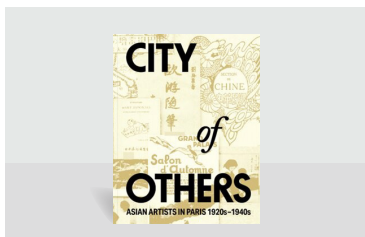
