His deep appreciation for architectural detail and historical significance shines through his artworks, earning him the nickname, <i>Building Whisperer</i>. He has exhibited his works in Southeast Asia, including Vietnam. His paintings can be found in the collections of government ministries, organizations, and private individuals. Jeffrey holds a Master of Project Management (QUT) and a Bachelor of Architecture degree (NUS). He is a recipient of several awards, including the Anugerah MENDAKI Excellence Award. As co-founder of Maya Gallery, he has mentored young artists and spoken at various events. <u>Masturah Sha'ari</u> Masturah Sha'ari is a Singaporean artist, curator, and art historian. Her abstract works reflect the emotional landscapes of her journeys. Through layered colours, marks, and textures, she captures moments of reflection, in response to her life experiences and environmental shifts. Using unconventional tools such as construction boards and trowels alongside brushes, she explores new forms and embraces intuition. Her paintings, though deeply introspective, resonate with viewers who often find calm and serenity in their quiet depths. For her, art is not merely about beauty, but making sense of the world as it unfolds, finding meaning to life's ever-changing rhythms. <u>Maya Gallery</u> Maya Gallery, established in 2012 by Singaporean artist couple Jeffrey Wandly and Masturah Sha'ari, celebrates Singapore's rich multicultural heritage, with a focus on Malay and Southeast Asian artists. The gallery represents pioneering masters S. Mohdir, Sulaiman Suhaimi, Sarkasi Said, and Idris Ali, and has showcased works of master potter Iskandar Jalil, alongside established artists including Salleh Japar, Suriani Suratman, Hiroko Mita, P. Gnana and Rosihan Dahim, while continuing to support emerging talent. As a non-profit gallery, its dedication to dialogue, research and publishing has cemented its critical role in raising awareness of the nation's art history, contributing to our cultural landscape, and bridging cross-cultural understanding in the international art community.

		Sha'ari Tadin (1932 – 2009) Politician, Educator, Community Leaders Sha'ari bin Tadin (2 August 1932 – 13 December 2009), was a Singaporean politician and educator. Representing the People's Action Party from 1968 to 1980, he was Parliamentary Secretary and later Senior Parliamentary Secretary for Culture, where he promoted the arts, culture, sports, and youth development. 		Wandly Yazid Acclaimed music composer, arranger, and musician Wandly Yazid (1925 – 2005) was a distinguished Sumatran-born and Singapore-based composer, arranger and musician celebrated for his contributions to Malay film, radio and television music from the 1940s through the 1960s. He is best known for composing and directing the music for the classic film Gurindam Jiwa and served as Musical Director at Cathay-Keris Films, where he composed and arranged for over a dozen films. He also founded his own orchestras and record label, performed as a violinist with the Singapore Symphony Orchestra and Singapore Broadcasting Corporation Orchestra, and arranged music for radio and TV programmes. Recognised for his lifelong impact on the region's music
